CELEBRANT: Dear friends, Jesus calls us to make his costly passion for God's reign our own. As his faithful followers, let us pray with undivided hearts for a new heaven and a new earth.

READER: We pray for the church local and global, that like Jeremiah and Jesus it will dare to announce unwelcome truths boldly for salvation's sake. (Pause) Lord, hear us.

We pray for the baptised faithful, that no believer will lose sight of Jesus who leads us in our faith and brings it to fulfilment. (Pause) Lord, hear us.

We pray for today's children, women and men trapped in economic or sexual servitude, that campaigners against modern slavery will succeed in setting them free. (Pause) Lord, hear us.

We pray for all participants in this week's national economic roundtable, that they will set aside vested interests and debate what is best for the common good. (Pause) Lord, hear us.

We pray for Australia's children, that this year's Children's Book Week will thrill them with the adventure of reading. (Pause) Lord, hear us.

We pray for families bitterly divided, that they will find the way to healing, forgiveness and reconciliation. (Pause) Lord, hear us.

We pray for those who have died recently, and those whose anniversary of death occurs around this time, that they will be led by Christ their Good Shepherd to the banquet of eternal life. (Pause) Lord, hear us.

CELEBRANT: God of unfailing mercy, by the power of the Holy Spirit you free us to follow your Son. Give us the courage to be true to him. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

A REFLECTION: There are two kinds of silence. There is the silence of the graveyard. This silence speaks of death ... it frightens and repels. Then there is the silence of a spring evening. Not a leaf stirs, not a sound is heard except the music of the birds. This silence is mysterious and enchanting. Amid this silence all things are awake, all things are growing. So, too, there are two kinds of peace. There is the peace of the swamp. The swamp's surface looks normal and is serene, but its depths are full of rotten things. This is the peace of injustice. It is a false peace that Jesus disrupts. Then there is 'true peace' – a peace where the basic rights of all persons are respected. In this peace everyone is able to live in freedom and dignity.

Let us pray: Lord, it is true peace which you bring. Yet peace like this doesn't happen – it has to be made. Sometimes, Lord, the makers of peace are branded as troublemakers. But you teach us another name ... you call us: 'children of God.'

C.R.A. URGES GOVERNMENT TO REFORM YOUTH JUSTICE SYSTEM: Catholic Religious Australia has written to Prime Minister Anthony Albanese and Minister for Indigenous

Minister Anthony Albanese and Minister for Indigenous Australians Malarndirri McCarthy, calling on the government to lead a nationally coordinated reform of the youth justice system. In its letter, CRA expressed grave concerns about the state of the youth justice system in the Northern Territory, following the Inquest findings of Territory Coroner Elisabeth Armitage into the death of Kumanjayi Walker, a First Nations youth in custody.

The coroner found that the Northern Territory Police Force bears "significant hallmarks of institutional racism" and that "racist attitudes may have influenced" the "failure to take adequate steps to minimise the risk of a fatal interaction" with Mr Walker.

"Kumanjayi Walker was failed by the justice system in the Northern Territory. Juvenile detention isolated him from family and community for considerable periods of time throughout his childhood, and did not provide adequate early intervention or rehabilitation," CRA President Br Gerard Brady CFC said.

CRA also expressed alarm over recent legislative changes in the Northern Territory, including the lowering of the minimum age of criminal responsibility to 10, the reintroduction of spit hoods in youth detention centres, and the expansion of the list of offences ineligible for youth diversionary justice programs.

"Australia's religious women and men add their support to the calls from First Nations organisations and individuals for federal government leadership on a national overhaul of the youth justice system, moving away from punitive approaches and instead prioritising early intervention and holistic and culturally appropriate rehabilitation," CRA national executive director Anne Walker said.

"The recently released Closing the Gap Report shows that this is a national problem. Most states and territories have a minimum age of criminal responsibility below that recommended by child development and health experts, and Australia is not on track to reach the Closing the Gap target to reduce the rate of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people in detention by at least 30 per cent by 2031.

"We need urgent federal government action."

PRAYING AS ONE: A friendly reminder to everyone of the good habit we were in after the church was painted. We asked everyone who sits in the last rows of pews to consider moving a few seats forward at Mass in the vast St John's church. When there are only small numbers there, it's important we sit with each other rather than all across the seating area. This is a renewed, friendly request to everyone, if they could leave the back 5 or 6 pews empty, so we can all have a heightened sense of being God's people 'gathered as one', a bit like when the family gathers at the dining table for a celebratory meal. Perhaps those parishioners greeting and offering the bulletin could continue to offer a friendly reminder to move a few pews forward.

Originally it occurred before the Presentation of Gifts in response to Jesus' exhortation in Matthew 5:23-24: "If you bring your gift to the altar, and there recall that your brother has anything against you, leave your gift there at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift."

In the late fourth century the Sign of Peace moved to its present location immediately after the Our Father. This position links it with the last petition of the Lord's Prayer that we be forgiven "as we forgive those who trespass against us" and with the reception of Eucharist which follows.

In the Middle Ages the gesture came to be limited to the clergy alone and was eventually replaced by the priest's kissing of the altar. The 1969 Missal of Paul VI issued after the Second Vatican Council restored the Sign of Peace to the Mass. This was in line with the renewed emphasis on the communal aspect of liturgical worship, and also embodied the reminder from the Council that Christ is present in the assembly.

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) describes the Rite of Peace as a sign of conversion and peace-making, leading us to the Holy Communion of the Body of Christ, the Church. It then explains how the sign is expressed: "In the dioceses of Australia the most common form of the gesture of peace is the handshake, although different practices according to region and culture are not excluded. However, it is appropriate that each person offer the sign of peace only to those who are nearest and in a sober manner." (GIRM 82)

The Sign of Peace needs to be kept in proportion and not occupy more time than other more important elements of the celebration. The Sign of Peace is about imparting to others the blessing of Christ's peace not shaking hands and saying Hello to as many people as possible in the available time: hospitality is practised as people arrive for Mass, not when it is almost over!

FIRST READING: (Jeremiah 38:4-6, 8-10)
